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Grade 3 Book Project Choice Board

Students will need to choose two boxes to complete their novel readings. Each written project should be ¾ of a page or longer.

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Book Cover Create a book cover for the book you read. Make sure it looks different from the actual book cover. On the front include the title, author, illustrator, and a picture. On the back include the setting, characters, genre, and a summary of the book. Materials Needed: drawing paper, markers, crayons	Comic Strip Create a comic strip showing 5 major events from the book in sequence. Include captions and /or dialogue bubbles to retell the story along with pictures. Materials Needed: computer paper cut into strip, and, pencil, crayons	Friendly Letter Write a one page to a friend recommending your book. Tell your friend what the book was about and why you would recommend it. Make sure you include the title, author, characters, and setting. Write a letter to one of the characters of the story. Talk to them about events that happen in the story. You can also ask them questions about events that happened.
Poster Board Create a poster board trying to convince other students to read your book. In your advertisement you need to include the title, author, and summary. ASCA Junior High Summer Reading List 2015

We are sure you can't wait for summer to begin-long, fun-filled days without school. Not so fast! We all know summer is the time to catch up on your own outside reading interest: sci-fi, adventure tales, mysteries, etc. However, before you get lost in your own literary world, you have a few reading assignments to complete before school resumes this fall. In preparation for your Language Arts class in junior high, we expect you to read 2 books this summer from the ASCA Junior High Summer Reading List for students entering grades 6-8. In addition to reading the required books, you must also complete the attached graphic organizer and bring it to class on the first day of school.

This year's summer reading theme is *Every Hero Has a Story*. Heroes are everywhere, and their stories are worth reading. This year's reading list will include some books with heroes and their stories. Just pick a book to find the hero inside.

Also, think of an everyday hero in your life. Perhaps this person is a parent, coach, teacher, doctor/nurse, fireman, cancer/illness survivor or someone who has overcome incredible odds. This summer, have your hero tell you his/her story and take a picture with him/her to bring to school to give to your English/Language Arts teacher on the first day. We will display these in the hallway outside each ELA classroom.

Although the requirement is to read 2 books for the coming 2015-2016 school year, it is highly recommended that student read more than 2 books over the summer months to increase vocabulary and reading comprehension. Check out your public library for more suggestions to locate books that match individual interests and reading levels.
